



How did Vladimir Putin win Russians' support for his genocidal war in Ukraine and why are so many of them willing to embrace fascism? This vivid, bottom-up narrative reveals the dark realities of youth fascism in Russia - and the darker future awaiting the country if that hold cannot be broken. Wartime Russia is drowning in fascist symbols. Zealous patriots attack journalists, opposition activists, and anyone suspected of betraying the motherland. Hordes of online trolls and sleek videos of angry young men urge citizens to join the cause. State television terrifies viewers with false tales of anti-Russian conspiracies and genocidal yearnings. Child soldiers proudly parade across Red Square. This is Russia in the 2020s: a land of performative rage and nationalist untruth, where pretence and broken promises are a way of life, and an apocalyptic mindset is seizing tomorrow's Russians.

Ian Garner's research focuses on Soviet and Russian War Propaganda. The author of *Stalingrad Lives: Stories of Combat and Survival*, he studied at the Universities of Bristol and Toronto, and at the St. Petersburg State Conservatory.


A compelling story of how ordinary Ukrainians saved their nation.

With Russian shells raining on Kyiv and tanks closing in, American forces prepared to evacuate Ukraine's leader. Just three years earlier, his apparent main qualification had been playing a president on TV. But Volodymyr Zelensky reportedly retorted, 'I need ammunition, not a ride.' Ukrainian forces won the battle for Kyiv, ensuring their country's independence even as a longer war began for the southeast.

You cannot understand the historic events of 2022 without understanding Zelensky. But the Zelensky effect is less about the man himself than about the civic nation he embodies: what makes Zelensky most extraordinary in war is his very ordinariness as a Ukrainian.

The Zelensky Effect explains this paradox, exploring Ukraine's national history to show how its now-iconic president reflects the hopes and frustrations of the country's first 'independence generation'. Interweaving social and political background with compelling episodes from Zelensky's life and career, this is the story of Ukraine told through the journey of one man who has come to symbolise his country.



The untold tale of heroic battles for freedom in the Baltic states, during and after World War II.

A common view is that the Second World War in Europe ended in May 1945. But fighting continued for over a decade in the Baltic states. Stuck between two totalitarian regimes–Stalin's USSR and Hitler's Reichthe populations of Estonia, Latvia and Lithuania had been subjected to a brutal Soviet occupation in 1940, Nazi invasion in 1941, and Soviet re-occupation in 1944, falsely branded as 'liberation'.

Variously labelled 'freedom fighters' or 'Nazi bandits' by historians, the Baltic partisans who would become known as the Forest Brothers fought a long campaign against occupation that eventually failed under the might of the USSR. Much of this history of armed resistance, which was also a front in the intelligence war between East and West, is little known outside the region. Treachery, betrayal, heroism and lost futures all play a role in this fascinating tale, as Dan Kaszeta explores themes of independence, nationalism, Baltic identity, the fluidity of boundaries in Eastern Europe, and the comparative weight of Nazi and Soviet oppression.

Dan Kaszeta is a Specialist Defence and Security consultant of Lithuanian ancestry, who has long studied Baltic history. An associate fellow at the Royal United Services Institute and the author of *Toxic*, he has held positions in the US Secret Service and White House Military Office.



Monarchs, dictators and elected leaders alike have a dismal record on military decision-making, from overambitious goals to disregarding intelligence, terrain, or enemy capabilities. This not only wastes the lives of civilians, the enemy and one's own soldiers, but also fails to achieve geopolitical objectives, and usually lays the seeds for more wars down the line.

Conflict scholar and former soldier Mike Martin takes the reader through the hard, elegant logic to fighting a conclusive interstate war that solves geopolitical problems, and reduces future conflict. In cool and precise prose, he outlines how to orchestrate military forces, from infantry to information, and from strategy to tactics.

How to Fight a War explains the unavoidable, yet seemingly elusive, art of using violence to force your enemies to do what you want. It should be read by everyone seeking to understand today's wars, as well as those wishing to lead us through the coming decades of conflict.



Russia's invasion of Ukraine in February 2022 was an imperial war long in the making. Putin's Russia wants its empire back and has been at war with the West for years; it took the events in Ukraine for the West to realize it. Ukraine is just the latest in a series of Putin's wars of aggression: Chechnya, Georgia, Crimea, Syria and Ukraine. Initially, the war in Chechnya propelled Putin to the presidency. War then proved central to his rule. It helped craft the new social contract between president and people, a contract grounded in a shared vision of Russian national identity and its place in the world.

This book examines each of Putin's military interventions to show how Russia rebuilt itself after the 1990s, how it embraced authoritarian politics and developed an imperial view of itself and its place in the world through a series of bloody conflicts.


Alex J. Bellamy is professor of Peace and Conflict studies and director of the Asia Pacific Centre for the Responsibility to Protect at the University of Queensland, Australia. A Fellow of the Academy of Social Sciences in Australia, he has served as a consultant to the United Nations, was a non-resident senior adviser at the International Peace Institute, New York, and has been a visiting fellow at the University of Oxford. His most recent books include *Syria Betrayed: War, Atrocities, and the Failure of International Diplomacy* (2022) *and World Peace (And How We Can Achieve it)* (2019).

Generally attributed to the Western imagination, science fiction is a literary genre that has expressed projected technological progress since the Industrial Revolution. However, certain fantastical elements in African literary expressions lend themselves to science fiction interpretations, both utopian and dystopian.

When divorced from its Western, rationalist, materialist, positivist underpinnings, science fiction represents a broad imaginative space that supersedes the limits of this world. Whether it be on the moon, under the sea, or elsewhere within the imaginative universe, Afrofuturist readings of select films, novels, short stories, plays, and poems reveal a similarly emancipatory African future that is firmly rooted in its own cultural mythologies, cosmologies, and philosophies. Joslin identifies the contours and modalities of a speculative. futurist science fiction rooted in the sociocultural and geopolitical context of continental African imaginaries. Constructing an arc that begins with gender identity and cultural plurality as the bases for an inherently multicultural society, this project traces the essential role of language and narrativity in processing traumas that stem from the violence of colonial and neocolonial interventions in African societies.

Joslin then outlines the influential role of discursive media that construct divisions and create illusions about societal success, belonging, and exclusion, while also identifying alternative critical existential mythologies that promote commonality and social solidarity.

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Kitty's Salon was the most notorious brothel in the decadent Berlin of the Weimar Republic – the city of 'Cabaret'. But after the Nazis took power, it became something more dangerous: a spying centre with every room wired for sound, staffed by women agents specially selected by the SS to coax secrets from their VIP clients. Masterminded by the spymaster Hitler himself called 'the man with the iron heart' Reinhard Heydrich, architect of the Holocaust and the most sinister Nazi of them all, the exclusive establishment turned listening post was patronised by the Nazi leaders themselves, not knowing that hidden ears were listening.

One of the last untold stories of the Second World War, - previously only known via it's portrayal in the Nazi sexploitation soft porn movie 'Salon Kitty', (1976), - Salon Kitty's no less sansational true history is now revealed by historians Nigel Jones, Urs Brunner and Dr Julia Schrammel. After years of painstaking research and investigation, the story they tell sheds new light on Nazi methods of control and coercion, and the way that they used and abused sex for their own perverse purposes. Salon Kitty's story is set in the wider context of the Third Reich's cynical and hypocritical attitude to sex and prostitution; - a mix of repression and cynical exploitation; of the vicious feuds between it's competing espionage agencies, and of the cruel choice faced by the Salon's owner, Kitty Schmidt herself, when compelled to collaborate and herself become 'a spy in the house of love'. At once a deconstruction and reconstruction of a hidden history, Kitty's Salon is a gripping true story of historical detection that sheds a harsh light on one of the darkest last secrets of the Third Reich.

German Blood, Slavic Soil reveals how Nazi Germany and the Soviet Union, twentieth-century Europe's two most violent revolutionary regimes, transformed a single city and the people who lived there. During World War II, this single city became an epicenter in the apocalyptic battle between their two regimes.

Drawing on sources and perspectives from both sides, Nicole Eaton explores not only what Germans and Soviets thought about each other, but also how the war brought them together. She details an intricate timeline, first describing how Königsberg, a sevenhundred-year-old German port city on the Baltic Sea and lifelong home of Immanuel Kant, became infamous in the 1930s as the easternmost bastion of Hitler's Third Reich and the launching point for the Nazis' genocidal war in the East. She then describes how, after being destroyed by bombing and siege warfare in 1945, Königsberg became Kaliningrad, the westernmost city of Stalin's Soviet Union. Königsberg/Kaliningrad is the only city to have been ruled by both Hitler and Stalin as their own - in both wartime occupation and as integral territory of the two regimes. German Blood, Slavic Soil presents an intimate look into the Nazi-Soviet encounter during World War II. Eaton shows how this outpost city, far from the centers of power in Moscow and Berlin, became a closed-off space where Nazis and Stalinists each staged radical experiments in societal transformation and were forced to reimagine their utopias in dialogue with the encounter between the victims and proponents of the two regimes.

How will protecting our digital infrastructure shape our future?

Cybersecurity is one of the key practical and political challenges of our time. It is at the heart of how modern societies survive and thrive, yet public understanding is still rudimentary: media portrayals of hoodie-wearing hackers accessing the Pentagon don't convey its complexity or significance to contemporary life. This book addresses this gap, showing that the political dimension is as important as the technological one. It accessibly explains the complexities of global information systems, the challenges of providing security to users, societies, states and the international system, and the multitude of competing players and ambitions in this arena. Making the case for understanding it not only as a technical project, but as a crucial political one that links competing visions of what cybersecurity is for, it tackles the ultimate question: how can we do it better?

Tim Stevens is reader in International Security at the Department of War Studies, King's College London. He has published widely on the politics of cybersecurity, cyberwarfare and cyber conflict, and the relationship between technology and global security in academic articles, edited volumes, and has written or edited four books. He is also editor of the book series *Critical Issues in Digital Security and Society*.



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QAnon conspiracy theorists, white supremacists, armed militias, radical right, icons of anger, America seen from the right is a galaxy of acronyms and extraparliamentary political formations as unacknowledged, as active and dangerous.

The assault of a part of them in the Congress of the United States on the morning of January 6, 2021 unveiled them in small part, shedding light just on the "Donald Trump people". This book maps the origins of the phenomenon and explains without filters or partisanship what is happening in American society and politics,

It also contains illustrations of the symbols, logos and flags of the alt-right galaxy.

This reflects the different sides to the Duce's leadership: while adept at nurturing and enforcing his personal political power, Mussolini's lack of insight into the requirements of governance prevented him from converting this power into influence to achieve his goals. His efforts to maintain the support of Italy's conservative elites - economic, social and political - also created tensions with his radical Fascist ambitions, diminishing the momentum behind his regime.

Mussolini is frequently portrayed as a charismatic leader, but his rule was secured principally by coercion, violence and a 'spoils system'. Nonetheless, his personality cult had significant popular appeal, even if based upon a political myth. This enabled him to consolidate his position and to dominate his Fascist colleagues—but at a price of over-centralised, dysfunctional decision-making.

In this book, the first comprehensive English-language study of Mussolini in nearly two decades, Peter J. Williamson brings to life the contradictions within the Duce's leadership. Using a wide range of sources, Williamson reveals how these conflicts impeded the dictator's ambitions, leaving him increasingly frustrated, all while most Italians endured the severe privations of both failure and Fascism.

Peter J. Williamson is a former scholar of Political Science and Public Policy (1980-91). His previous book **Varieties of Corporatism** covered Mussolini's corporatist system, and he has retained an interest in Italy's dictator since.




Clifford Thurlow, a foreign correspondent for The Observer in Athens, is known as 'one of the best ghostwriters in the UK,' according to Penny Wark of The Times. His recent books are: Typhoon: The Inside Story of a Fighter Squadron at War, for Wing Commander Mike Sutton (Penguin, 2021); Operation Jihadi Bride, rescuing women from ISIS, for quiet British hero John Carney (Hachette, 2019) and two Sunday Times best-selling memoirs Today I'm Alice for Alice Jamieson and Runaway for Emily Mackenzie.

Sex, Surrealism, Dali and Me, for Carlos Lozano, has been translated into numerous languages and was the basis of Thurlow's 60-minute Arts & Entertainments documentary on Salvador Dali made to coincide with the centenary of the artist's birth in 2004.

A new look at a revolutionary writer, a racist empire and a diverse city, brought uncomfortably together by a bold trick on the Royal Navy.

In February 1910, a young Virginia Woolf played the most famous practical joke in British military history. Blackening her face and masquerading as an African prince, with friends she conned her way onto the Dreadnought, the Empire's best battleship. The stunt made headlines around the world for weeks, embarrassed the Royal Navy, and provoked heated discussions in parliament. But who was the 'girl prince' unidentified in public debate at the time, and what was she doing there? The Girl Prince intertwines three fascinating stories: a scandalous prank and its afterlife; Woolf's ideas about race and empire; and the true Black experience in Britain, from real princes to Caribbean writers and South African activists. Woolf's social circle was almost exclusively white, but Black lives edged and echoed hers within the rich fabric of national culture, including in response to the hoax. Using letters, diaries, reporting and newly discovered archives, Danell Jones describes an extraordinary chain of events, exploring how and why this future revolutionary novelist joined in a bigoted blackface prank, and probing what it tells us - about Woolf's Britain and Woolf's work.

Danell Jones is a writer and scholar with a PhD in Literature from Columbia University. She is the author of *The Virginia Woolf Writers Workshop*; the poetry collection *Desert Elegy* and *An African in Imperial London*, which won the High Plains Book Award for Nonfiction.

In his updated version, Deborah Hart Strober and Gerald Strober provide new insight into both the world's most famous royal personality and her likely successors.





Peter Gloor's research focus is on the analysis of temporal communication patterns of virtual teams to increase knowledge worker innovation and productivity by discovering and optimizing Collaborative Innovation Networks and Collaborative Knowledge Networks, according to his concept of Swarm Creativity.

This insightful and comprehensive book uses theory and empirical studies to debunk contemporary illusions about the functionality of economies and examines the phenomena of economic magic and economic black magic. Norman C. Miller considers 11 economic myths, three of which are the theory that excessive imports reduce employment as firms are forced to downsize or shut down, that a more equal distribution of income kills incentives and reduces economic growth rates and the myth that a higher minimum wage always generates a net decrease in employment. Chapters examine the effects of advances in technology, poverty and income inequality, international trade, and trade deficits on employment and economic growth. 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t's ironic that the very stuff keeping us alive is killing more of us than anything else on the planet: the equivalent of 7-10 million people each year - four times more than road accidents, three times more than cigarettes, 15 times more than wars and violence, and more than malaria and AIDS combined. Dirty air affects every country and continent, rural areas as well as cities, and children and the elderly are most at risk. Remarkably, 90 percent of the world's entire population breathes polluted air. The consequence? Air pollution is now a prime suspect in six of the top ten causes of death.


From Delhi (where the air can be as bad for you as smoking 50 cigarettes a day) to Mexico City (where the concrete walls of a cutting-edge hospital are helping to mop up traffic fumes), from Paris (where winter smog wipes the Eiffel Tower from the skyline) to Hong Kong (where tourists, tired of pollution, take selfies in front of fake photographic backdrops), and from Beijing (where a third of air pollution pumps from factories making western goods) to Washington (where politicians are systematically downplaying the links between dirty air and poor health), Breathless takes us on a whistlestop world tour of a cruelly-neglected issue. Will better technology - things like electric cars - really make a difference? Why do we expect new laws to clean up our cities when old ones have failed to do so for decades? What will it take to make our governments get a firm grip on this most intractable of problems?

Chris Woodford is a journalist. He's written, cowritten, and edited dozens of science education books, which have been translated into around 20 different languages.

Artificial Intelligence is everywhere, yet it causes damage to society in ways that can't be fixed. Instead of helping to address our current crises, Al causes divisions that limit people's life chances, and even suggests fascistic solutions to social problems. This book provides an analysis of Al's deep learning technology and its political effects and traces the ways that it resonates with contemporary political and social currents, from global austerity to the rise of the far right. Dan McQuillan calls for us to resist AI as we know it and restructure it by prioritising the common good over algorithmic optimisation. He sets out an anti-fascist approach to AI that replaces exclusions with caring, proposes people's councils as a way to restructure Al through mutual aid and outlines new mechanisms that would adapt to changing times by supporting collective freedom.

Academically rigorous, yet accessible to a socially engaged readership, this unique book will be of interest to all who wish to challenge the social logic of Al by reasserting the importance of the common good.

Dan McQuillan is lecturer in Creative and Social Computing at Goldsmiths, University of London. In the early days of the world wide web, he started a pioneering website to provide translated information for asylum seekers and refugees. When open source hardware sensors started appearing he co-founded a citizen science project in Kosovo, supporting politically excluded young people to measure pollution levels and get the issue of air quality onto their national agenda. After a stint working in the NHS he joined Amnesty International and created their first digital directorate.



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Species evolve over time to become meticulously adapted to their environments, right? Well, sometimes.

There remain some curious oversights. Consider that an elephant will not grow a seventh set of teeth, even though the wearing down of the sixth will condemn it to starvation; hosts of the European cuckoo seem unable to tell that the overgrown monster in their nests is an interloper; male mandarin ducks sport bannerlike, predator-attracting, bright orange wing feathers for the purpose of attracting females - a task that the males of most other duck species achieve without any such impediment; and as for whales... Whales are fully aquatic mammals who, millions of years after first abandoning the land, still cannot breathe underwater. This is a book about evolution, but not its Greatest Hits. Instead it's an account of everything in the animal kingdom that is self-defeating, ill-made, uneconomical, and downright weird - and how natural selection has favoured it.


Drawing on scientific research in topics from ecology and palaeontology to sexual selection and genetics, this book takes the reader on the little-travelled journey of evolutionary eccentricities.

Dr **Andy Dobson** is a research biologist whose papers have been cited well over 1000 times in the academic literature. After a first-class degree in Ecology from Durham, Andy completed a PhD on the ecology of hen harriers at Nottingham University, before joining the University of Oxford's Zoology Department. He also remains a Visiting Academic at Edinburgh.

It is widely understood that race is a social fact with profound implications for life chances, group identity, collective representation and for the social order. Whiteness', the source of race-based inequality and injustice is perpetuated through power, violence and an array of complex processes which help protect the status quo. While there has been much focus on the psychological harm of racism on people of colour, less attention has been paid to the role of psychological functioning of white groups in maintaining unequal social configurations.

She examines how the psychological and psychic factors involved in the reproduction of whiteness intersect with macro structures, shedding light on everyday race dynamics, race inequality and racial violence of interest to all who seek to understand the impact of 'whiteness' so they can be more effective anti-racists.

Guilaine Kinouani is a psychologist and the director and founder of Race Reflections. She taught Critical Psychology and Black Studies at Syracuse University in London and her long-standing involvement in antiracism has deeply influenced her scholarship and thinking. Her award-winning work and writing have been featured in the media and her first book *Living While Black* exposed the impact of lived experiences of racism on black minds and bodies.



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Fire is a key physical process on earth, one that humans alone have worked out how to partly control. The power to use fire has transformed human societies and propelled us to the role of the dominant species in the biosphere. Simon Dalby argues that humanity's success in using fire has radically changed our circumstances, and unless we work out how to constrain this firepower soon, our success with combustion threatens to undo what we have created. The current challenge is to make a new economy for life after fossil fuels if a liveable earth is to be made available for future generations.

Simon Dalby is professor emeritus of Geography and Environmental Studies at Wilfrid Laurier University, Canada. He has written extensively on climate change, environmental security and geopolitics.

This book is a contribution to the social conversation on the city and its future. It focuses on an idea that has been circulating for a while and that, in recent years, has received wider attention: that of a city in which everything that is needed for daily life is just a few minutes away by foot from where people live. In addition, it focuses on the idea of a city where functional proximity corresponds to a relational proximity, thanks to which people have more opportunities to meet and support each other, care for each other and the environment, and collaborate to reach common goals. Ultimately, a city built around the life needs of its inhabitants and an idea of livable proximity in which they can find what they need to live, and to do so together with others. The underlying question in this book is: can we imagine the contemporary city starting from a new idea of proximity? The answer it gives is: yes, it can be done. In fact, the social innovations of the last 20 years show where to start from. Many cities in the world have made a commitment and are taking steps in this direction, offering concrete examples of what a city of proximity could be: a place where social innovation, care, common goods, shared places, and enabling digital platforms become the keywords of a new and widespread social capacity to design.



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
According to the OECD definition, space economy is the full range of activities that create value to human beings through exploring, researching, understanding, managing, and utilizing space. Space economy thus goes far beyond the space sector in the narrowly meant sense and encompasses many others: just think of agriculture, environmental protection, natural resource management and transportation, to name a few. By addressing these topics, this book aims to provide readers with a background to understand the constitutional issues raised by digital technologies.







The seven myths include the exaggeration of Rasputin's influence; a purported conspiracy behind the February Revolution; the treasonous Bolshevik dependence on German support; the multiple Anastasia pretenders to the royal inheritance; the antisemitic claims about "Judeo-Bolsheviks"; distortions about America's intervention in the civil war; and the "inevitability" of Bolshevism. In each case the authors analyze the facts, uncover the origins of the myth, and trace its later perseverance (even in contemporary Russia). To assist readers, the volume includes three reference guides (people, terms, dates), nine maps, and twentynine illustrations. The result is immensely valuable for undergraduate courses in Russian history."



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The fact that literature continues to reach us over the centuries is not solely our merit. Our reception today corresponds to a past anticipation that is inscribed in the texts. Literary communication takes place between time and creates a collective, a future 'we' that it addresses yet cannot fully know.

As Walter Benjamin reminds us, "For the Latins, 'Ad plures ire' meant 'to die". 'Joining the many' is an expression which does not sugarcoat death, but becomes instead a symbol of aesthetic and philological experience. The deceased form a collective which continues to speak to us through literature, and awaits us. The essays collected in this book attempt to follow them through the words of Ovid, Montaigne, Lacan and finally Benjamin. The reception corresponds to the literary anticipation, the - impossible and yet necessary - anticipation of the many readings to come that each text entails.

No philosopher has had such a rich impact over the centuries up to the present day as Plato. Although Plato - the founder of the "Academy" - had an internal doctrine of principles, he articulated his philosophy exclusively in the form of dialogues. In doing so, he shows that philosophizing, in the sense of searching for truth, always takes place in a living manner: dialogue is the necessary means of philosophical thinking. Therein lies the uniqueness of the Platonic work, which has reached us preserved in its entirety.



Groundbreaking, systematic, and illuminating, The phenomenology of pain opens a dialogue between phenomenology and such disciplines as cognitive science and cultural anthropology to argue that science alone cannot clarify the nature of pain experience without incorporating a phenomenological approach. Building on this premise, Geniusas develops a novel conception of pain grounded in phenomenological principles: pain is an aversive bodily feeling with a distinct experiential quality, which can only be given in original first-hand experience, either as a feelingsensation or as an emotion. Geniusas crystallizes the fundamental methodological principles that underlie phenomenological research and offers a phenomenological clarification of the fundamental structures of pain experience and contests the common conflation of phenomenology with introspectionism. Geniusas analyzes numerous pain dissociation syndromes, brings into focus the de-personalizing and re-personalizing nature of chronic pain experience, and demonstrates what role somatization and psychologization play in pain experience.

Saulius Geniusas is associate professor of Philosophy at the Chinese University of Hong Kong. He is the author of *The Origins of the Horizon in Husserl's Phenomenology*, and author of close to fifty articles for various philosophy journals and anthologies.

Exposing a fundamental but forgotten capacity to sense with others, this fresh approach to ethics centers on expressive, moving bodies in everyday affective encounters.

Common sense has yet to yield its golden promise: robust selves, a stable sense of reality, and bonds of solidarity. The Affection in Between argues that reimagining common sense involves tackling two intractable philosophical puzzles together: the problems of sensory integration and of "other minds." Construing common sense as either an individual cognitive capacity or a communal body of beliefs and practices, as our tradition of philosophical and political thought has done for too long, constricts possibilities of self and other, ethics and politics. Neither register alone can evade political manipulation and deliver common ground between confident yet unavoidably porous selves. The book proposes a new interpretation of the Aristotelian concept of sunaisthesis, an embodied, interactive capacity to create overlapping meaning through the cultivation of a sensibility that is neither individual nor communal but unfolds between bodies in movement. Bolstering Aristotle's concept with classical and contemporary phenomenology, Flakne offers fresh answers to a pressing and legitimate skepticism about selfhood and the role that ethics might play in countering disorientation and manufactured division.

April Flakne is a professor of Philosophy at New College of Florida. She has published numerous articles and book chapters on Aristotle, phenomenology and political philosophy.



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A child has ARFID (Avoidant/Restrictive Food Intake Disorder) if they eat too little and/or very selectively because of decreased interest in food, sensitivity to the sensory features of food, or irrational thoughts about eating certain foods. Children can become socially isolated as a result, because eating at school is difficult, treats have to be declined and holidays, wich involves food unknown to them, are problematic. A child might also fear to participate in activities such as children's parties, sleepovers, and school camps. Research into this disorder is still ongoing and much is still unknown, so parents and caregivers are often at a loss and face a lack of understanding for what others perceive as 'pickyness' or spoiled behaviour. They need professional information and advice as well as recognition and recognition from fellow sufferers.
